My courses

it's always good to practice your English and Andrew which is the Professor is super friendly and gives everyone the opportunity to get to know everybody in the course, which is nice considering I was there to learn about culture and meeting new people.

Social and cultural

The Hanyang University is much bigger than any institution I ever experienced and because of their size they are able to have many facilities such as basketball courts, football courts, tennis courts, golf court, gyms, and a lot of smaller clubs such as taekwondo, movies and other sports and social clubs. The biggest and best 'help' of them all is the Hanmille Group which provides everyone with their own Korean mentor to help you with practical things, show you around and just spend time with. Hanmille also organizes some big cultural trips for all the mentors and mentees (exchange students), which I all would recommend joining.

Regarding the living situation I would always recommend living at the dorms and NEVER in an Airbnb or something similar due the fact that, at the dorms all the exchange student are living together and it's a nice thing being able to eat some fried chicken as a night snack with the other exchange students, walking home from the cinema or drunk together – there will be a lot of small but good moments you will miss if you don't live at the dorms.

Outside the Hanyang University you will mainly find restaurants, PC bangs, karaoke or cafés to hang out. In the city center of Ansan there is some shopping, nightlife, etc.

But even though Seoul is much better for shopping, nightlife, etc. considering the time it takes to go to Seoul I would recommend enjoying the nightlife in Ansan as well. I have had a lot of fun nights at "No Name" in Ansan.



Traveling

I would properly recommend flying to South Korea about 2 weeks before the semester starts and properly stay in Seoul, so you get some adjusting time to get an idea of the energy, culture, how everything works, and just explore Seoul which you might not get the same opportunity to when the semester start.

Within the semester the exchange students arranged different smaller trips to Japan, China, and other bigger cities in South Korea, which I would recommend joining.

After the semester I personally had to come back to Denmark, but I think the better thing would have been to visit nearby countries or if there should be places in South Korea you would like to visit, either by yourself or with some of the other students.

Jeju Island should have amazing nature you can't see anywhere else in the world, but to get the best experience you should rent a car which you need an international driver license to do. Therefore I would strongly recommend getting this before going.

I stayed at hostels or Airbnb most of the time I was away from the dorms, but especially in Japan I enjoyed the experience of staying at a capsule hotel for a couple of nights.

Expectations

I have never been in Northeast Asia so I wasn't really sure what to expect, but I ended up learning a lot about the Korean history and culture which made me understand the Korean people and their actions better.






