## Classes & Lecturers

We had four main lecturers in the course: Tom, Vince, Richard & Andy. The one that was standing out most was Vince. He was our senior lecturer, very strict but fair, likes to criticize and "provoke" you, so you would get out of your comfort zone and see things from another perspective. He likes to have the last word in a discussion. You would think that everyone would try to avoid him but it was actually the other way around. ## I had four different classes at NTU:

- Construction Technology
- Technology & Design Studio
- Planning, Development & Survey
- Integrated Design & Communication

In **Construction Technology** classes, you will get a better understanding of construction design and technologies behind it, why buildings are constructed the way they are, material choices, structures and drawing by hand in scale.

We had a lecture and a seminar every Monday where we got an assignment afterwards, which we had to hand in digitally every Wednesday.

In **Technology & Design** Studio classes, you are going to learn about technical aspects associated with building environments and performance requirements.

We had this class every Tuesday followed by a seminar afterwards where you have a chance to talk to the teacher, ask questions face to face, and get everything explained. Sometimes there were up to four lecturers in the seminar to answer your questions.

In **Planning, Development & Survey** you are going to learn about building regulations, planning applications, local authorities, SWOT analysis, building permits and all the legal stuff. We had a project where we had the whole week of surveying where we actually learned how to do it professionally. How to read data and write it etc. We had a guest lecturer for that project that was an educated surveyor.

In **Integrated Design & Communication** classes, you will learn mostly about Revit. They are still using CAD there, so they have classes on Revit and how to use it. They also learn how to use some other programs like InDesign and helps you to create a professional CV.


We went to some study trips with the class organized by school. One of them was a trip to Birmingham. There we experienced the difference in architecture between Nottingham and Birmingham.

## Campuses & class facilities

NTU has six campuses: Arkwright, Newton, Maudsley, Bonnington, Waverley & Chaucer. Most of our classes were in Newton, Arkwright, Maudsley & Bonnington. All campuses are relatively close to each other like five minutes' walk. Newton campus has a big canteen.

## Accommodation

When you get the confirmation for your studies in Nottingham start looking for a place to stay. Even though the flight tickets are cheap to and from Copenhagen, the train tickets to the airport (I traveled from Luton) can be expensive. Sometimes it can reach up to 80 pounds one-way so it is important to book your ticket as soon as possible when you know that you will be travelling somewhere.

#### Food


## Conclusion




