## What classes did you take during your semester abroad? Please briefly explain what each class was about.

#### Sales Management: Steven Guest

This course was a last priority when I choose my courses, but actually, one of the best I had. Again, I really think it's because of the teacher. He was really good to make us understand, how you could use this course, not only when you need to make a sale, but also, for job-interviews, family feuds and other places, where skills of negotiation and persuasion comes in handy

#### **International Business: Kereem Gurses**

This course was a bit hard for me. # 1. How helpful was the receiving school in the process of choosing classes and settling you in?

### **Cultural/Personal Experience**

### 1. What challenges did you experience culturally while being a broad?

Well the school is not as structured as we are used to in Denmark. The locals in Barcelona, is not that open towards tourists, so the idea I had, about going to Barcelona, meet a lot of locals and get a lot of new friends in the city, never happened. I did get a lot of new friends, but mostly just exchange students.

I was also very surprised, when my courses started. I'm okay at English; Social English. But I had to be extra focused to understand what the teacher was talking about. Sometimes I couldn't understand anything, because almost all my teachers had a very thick accent,

Also, in the start, you were just on your own. Only, because one guy was brave enough to stand up and yell out loud after the information meeting "Hey let's make a whatsapp group!" did some of us get together. If he didn't do anything, then when the school started, we would all be splitted into different courses, and then it would be hard to get to know each other.

### a. How helpful was the receiving school in this process?

I don't think any of us asked for helped in this process.

But I did ask, in the start, if there were any social things happening. The teacher at the information meeting just laughed at me and said no, as if it was the strangest thing in the world. Coming from a school where we have a hole week of social activities, I was of course disappointed. Specially, because at the same meeting, they told us, that they had to push our, school start for a week. So that was 2 weeks I had to just walk around alone in Barcelona. I even told my friends some time before, not to meet me, because I of course thought I would be busy getting to know people.

# 2. What was the best cultural/personal experience during your studies abroad?

I learned a lot about myself in different situations. I also learned that I can quickly adapt and create a home in a different culture. The best thing was, that even though I was a lot older than all the other exchange students, I really loved being around them, and they were all so kind and open, because we all were in the same situation, and therefore I got friendships quicker and deeper, than you normally will, when you start on a new education.

# 3. What advice would you give other KEA students going to study abroad at the receiving school?

Really read what the school is providing, and go for that, before the city. Else, you will work a lot on stuff, that is not interesting for you.

Don't listen when people tell you, that the standard of education I Spain are way lower then Denmark. You will have a lot of school work to do. At Kea, we are used to project-oriented work, where at La Salle, you have 6-7 different courses, with different homework and assignments every week, and therefore feels like a lot.
